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Course description We will address three topics: modality, persistence, and material constitution. In the first part of the course, we will focus on *de re* modality and ask, for example, what (if anything) it is in virtue of which this very statue, which is actually 10 feet tall, could have been 11 feet tall. In the second part of the course, we will focus on persistence and ask, for example, what (if anything) it is in virtue of which this very statue, which exists today, also existed yesterday. In the third part of the course, we will ask, for example, whether the statue is identical to the clay that it is made of—and we will see how claims about *de re* modality and persistence affect arguments about the relation between the statue and the clay.
